

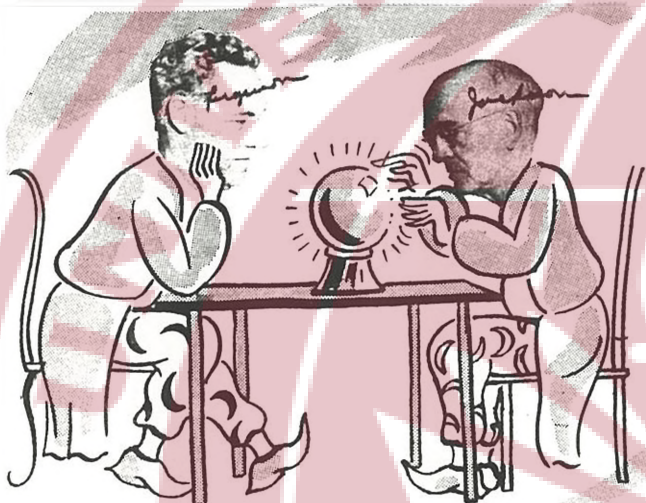

Our factory department is looking forward to another fine year. This will be the second season for our turbine drive on the crusher and the first three mills.

A new trash removal unit has been installed underneath the cane conveyor which will make work there more pleasant.

In the mill there are new remote controls on the Munson accumulators which regulate roller pressure. The mill operators will be able to regulate roller pressures from their control tables.

Together with the Westinghouse people, we are experimenting with Micarta water-cooled bearings. If they work out well, the life of our mill roller bearings and journals should increase by 20 times.

The boiling house is moving ahead with its controls program. High grade pans No. 5 and 6 will operate this year with new Speed-o-max electronic controls.

Our scheduled crop for 1954 is 4,328 acres. Of this 3,802 acres will be ratooned and 526 acres are planned for planting for the 1956 harvest.

Some of the fields like field 29 will be treated with trash before planting. We expect to plant about 15 acres of new land for an additional seed area.

Variety experiments continue. Last year, no new canes were discovered which appear to be better for Ewa's conditions, but the search will continue in 1954.

We hope to get better irrigation results from newly designed field layouts. This is important since aqua ammonia, distributed in irrigation water, is now our standard nitrogenous fertilizer.

What's Ahead

Harvesting is due to start January 5.

Behind us is a good year and we have prospects for another fine season.

A year's experience with last year's new equipment should spell smoother operations.

New methods of doing business are showing up every day and we will continue to add the best to Ewa and keep "Ewa First." Our Hawaiian Sugar industry is working through the H.S.P.A. to seek more uses for bagasse and molasses. Recent reports indicate that both feed and paper experiments are proving fruitful.

Our local labor relations have had a fairly smooth year. And, while our negotiators haven't reached a new agreement, we hope they will soon.

The cooperation of everyone plus a favorable distribution of sunshine and rain has made past years successful. It will take the sincere efforts of all and the blessing of good weather to give us a prosperous 1954.

ALIEN ADDRESS REPORT

JANUARY 1 TO JANUARY 31, 1954

WHO MUST REPORT

If you are not a citizen of the United States of America and you are in this country on January 1, 1954, you must submit an address report.

REQUIREMENTS

Every alien who is within the United States on the 1st day of January of each year, shall, within 30 days following such date report his address to the Commissioner, Immigration and Naturalization Service, and shall furnish such additional information as may be required by regulations. Any alien who is temporarily absent from the United States during the reporting period shall report his address within 10 days after his return to the United States.

DEPORTATION IS A PENALTY FOR FAILURE TO REPORT

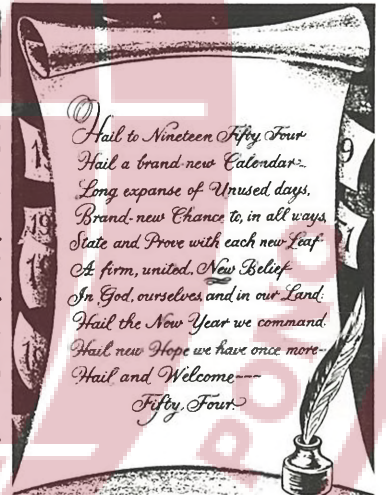
HOW TO REPORT

1. Go to any United States Post Office or any U. S. Immigration and Naturalization Office and ask for an Annual Address Report Form I-53.
2. Read the instructions on back of the card before you do anything else.
3. Turn card over and answer all eight (8) items in spaces to right of the arrows. Use typewriter, ink, or indelible pencil.
4. After you have completely filled in all spaces, check back over card to be sure you have not forgotten anything.
5. Write your signature and the date at the bottom of the card.
6. Take the completed card to any United States Post Office or Immigration and Naturalization Office and hand it to a clerk. Do not mail this card yourself.

HEALTH AND HAPPINESS

Let's start off the new year with our right foot forward by making this a safe and a happy New Year's Eve.

Each year, firecrackers cause injuries to many youngsters and grown-ups, often very serious and sometimes fatal. FIRECRACKERS ARE DANGEROUS! If you play with them, or allow your children to use them, be careful. Never forget for a moment that firecrackers are dangerous and that they are potential killers.

Firecrackers are also the chief cause of many, many costly fires every New Year's Eve.

Here in Ewa, sugar cane is the bread and butter of the 1,000 plantation employees and their families. Without sugar we aren't worth our salt. So be careful with those firecrackers. Don't play with firecrackers near the cane fields or shoot your sky rocket into the fields. Sky rockets shot into the cane fields have been the primary cause of our cane fires in the past. For example, last year a cane field near Filipino Village was set on fire by a sky rocket. Luckily, prompt action put it out before it got out of control. Don't let this happen again this New Year's Eve.

When you explode your firecrackers, explode them the safe way and at the right place. The right place is not by the cane fields. Protect your job, your home, your family, and yourself. Play safe and make this a happy New Year's Eve.
