YOUR MEDICAL PLAN

If you are a member of the Plantation Medical Plan—Has a dependent passed his (her) 19th birthday? Is he (she) attending school? Remember, unmarried dependent children reaching 19 years of age shall be automatically dropped from the plan unless the employee applies for membership of his dependent attending school on full-time basis. Is a dependent parent no longer living with you? Have you any new dependent? Have you a dependent who recently married? In short—are there any changes to be made in your records? You know best when the change takes place. It's up to you to let the Industrial Relations office know. Someone who should be covered by the Medical Plan may not be covered. On the other hand, you may be paying for someone who isn't eligible. Come to the Industrial Relations office if you have any changes to make. Remember—it's up to you.

MEMORIAL DAY

Writing in the Veterans of Foreign Wars Magazine, Bill Vaughan remarks: "When I read about American kids who form Nazi-like organizations, I get to thinking that maybe we've told them too much about how we won the war -- and not enough about why." I believe he is dead right. Even the movies we see on the subject of war usually concentrate on din and destruction rather than the reasons back of this violent carnage. Tennyson's old phrase from the Crimean War, "ours not to reason why" is still all too true. But to those who lost sons in battle, some worthy reason is essential. We were at war with a concept of society that would destroy our present way of life. (Mussolini openly sneered, "Democracy stinks".) We were at war against fascism, against the Gestapo, against anti-Semitism and the fate of Ann Franks for our sisters and our daughters. We were at war for the right to worship God. We were at war to preserve our secret ballot, and the view that government exists to serve the governed, not the view that people exist only to serve the State. For these rights, we fought, and many a youth gave his very life.

But as someone has phrased it, EVERY IDEAL WORTH DYING FOR, IS AN IDEAL WORTH LIVING FOR. And this, Bill Vaughan feels, we need to teach and preach and ingrain in our own hearts, and in the hearts of our living sons and daughters. Otherwise, what price victory?

Bishop Oldham of the Methodist Church has taken that phrase "America First!" and filled it with meaning for every one who believes in the destiny of America, and our way of life:

AMERICA FIRST!
Not only in science, inventions, skyscrapers, astronauts, but also in ideals, character, principles.

Not only in the assertion of our rights, but in the assumption of duties.

AMERICA FIRST!
Not flouting her strength like a giant, but bending in helpfulness over the underprivileged and outcast peoples like a Good Samaritan.

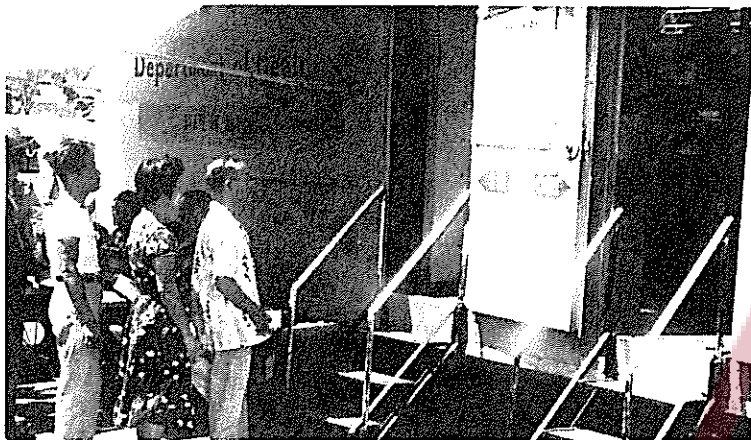
Not in pride, arrogance and disdain of other races, but in sympathy, aid, and common understanding.

AMERICA FIRST!
Not in treading the old, bloody pathway that ends in chaos, destruction and ruin, but in blazing new trails along which, please God, others will follow, into the realm of justice for all.

WEATHER

The weather was mostly clear with trade-winds prevailing last week. However a week before that, an unseasonable Kona storm developed on Thursday night, May 12, bringing heavy showers accompanied by lightning and thunder on Thursday and Friday nights. Rainfall totals for the three-day period (May 13-15) ranged from 1.29" at DPD to 2.61" at Pump 7.

IRRIGATION

3,486 acres were irrigated last week. Irrigation was confined to the big cane after the May 14 rain.

PREPARATION



This new equipment called the Payloader-Back Hoe tractor was recently purchased from the Hawaiian Equipment Company. This multi-purpose tractor does digging, scraping, grading, loading, etc. and will primarily be used in the Preparation Division. It may be used on other jobs outside of Preparation Division as needed.

HARVESTING

Harvesting operations last week started in Field 13. This field was completed Monday afternoon and all units moved to Field 50. A total of 104 acres were harvested.

FACTORY

Processing of cane was slower than normal on account of the excessive mud condition brought on because of the rain of the previous week. The feeder table was jammed on Monday, May 16, and the extension conveyor was overloaded on Tuesday both because of mud conditions. Sugar production was down and was the third poorest week to date this year. Sugar shipped and credited to manufacture amounted to 974.22 tons of 96° D.A., bringing the total shipped as of May 21 to 24,320.78 tons.

1,082 Ewa People Take Free X-Ray

During the three-day stand by the Board of Health mobile chest X-ray unit in Ewa, 1,082 people of our community took advantage of this free service designed to safeguard our health.

Troop 17 News

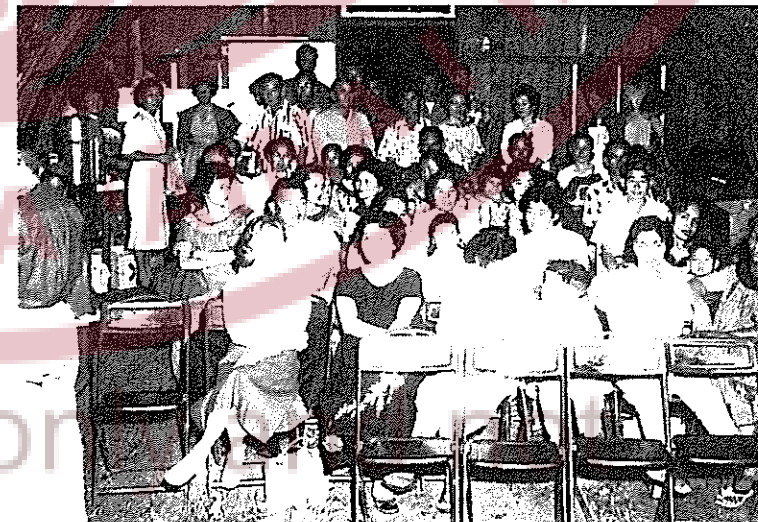
Parents and scouts of Troop 17 recently held a dinner get-together at the new headquarters of Troop 17 located back of the Tenney Recreation Center tennis court.
