Loss of Snake Specimens Mars Fair's Success

Two valuable specimens of King snake included in the State Department of Agriculture display in the Livestock and Farm Exhibit, disappeared from the display stand the last day of the Fair. The loss was a terrible blow to those responsible for arranging the display, but much, much worse for the Department of Agriculture scientists who had so painstakingly collected and preserved the specimens for research and educational purposes.

The specimens were encased in glass tubes 1 1/2 inches in diameter and four feet in length with rubber stoppers at both ends. The snakes are light brown in color with white rings over the entire body.

Whoever took these specimens, please heed this appeal - the Department of Agriculture would like to have them back, for they cannot be replaced. Or anyone knowing of their whereabouts please call the plantation's Industrial Relations Department, 683-966 or the State Department of Agriculture, 92-071.
