They both reported that the course was informative and proved to be very worthwhile.

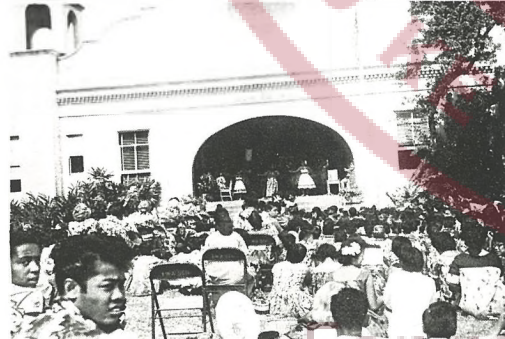
The Bard of Ewa Pens Farewell

REGULATIONS FOR THE USE OF HAU BUSH

- All persons planning to make use of the Hau Bush Recreation Area must register with the Industrial Relations Department where they will be issued a pass.
- This pass is not transferable and will only be good for the days and dates specified.
- An employee may take to Hau Bush as his guests up to five other persons, provided he himself is present with them. Any employee wishing to take more than five guests must make arrangements with the Industrial Relations Department.
- The gate must be closed and locked on entering and departing.
- Cars are not allowed to park on the athletic field.
- The holder of this pass will be held responsible for violation of any regulations by his guest members of his family.
- Rubbish must be put in the containers provided.
- The Ewa Plantation Company will not be responsible for personal injuries received, damage to and theft or loss of personal property while in the area.
- Key must be returned at the earliest convenient moment after termination of the dated permit.
- Violation of these regulations will be considered cause for suspension of the privilege to use this area.

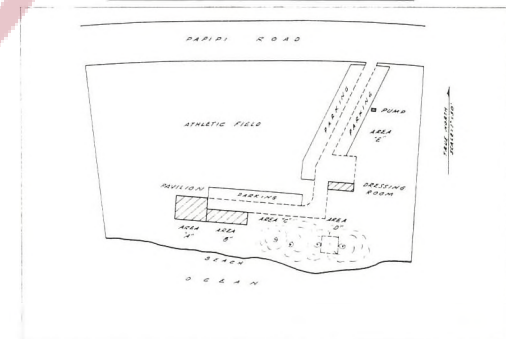
There are over 800 blind persons in the State of Hawaii today. More will lose their sight as a result of disease,

injury, and neglect.

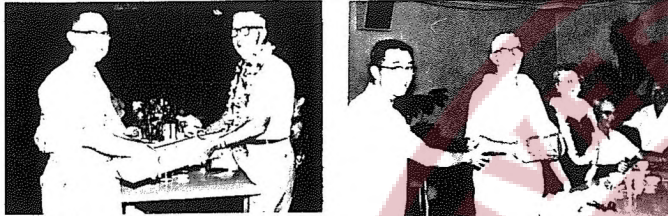
But here is an encouraging fact--HALF of all blindness is needless and preventable! In the light of that, we all agree that a great emphasis must be placed on preventing blindness.

Good eyesight for employees is a major factor! In all fields of work, good vision is essential to efficiency.

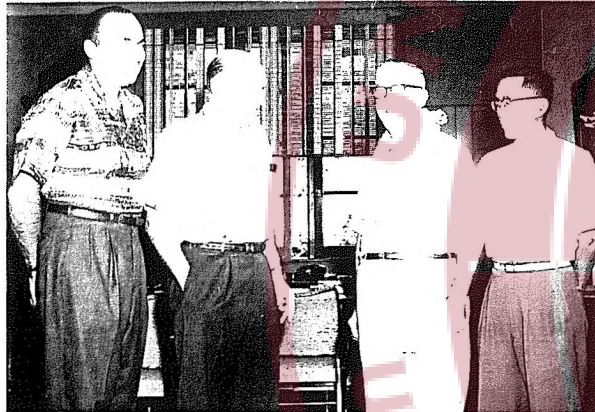

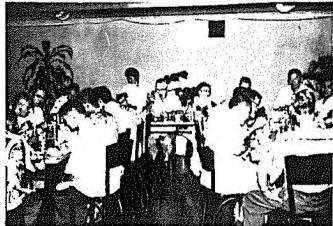

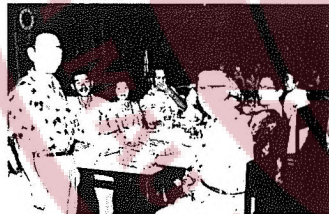
Kaku and Wallace say Aloha for the gang

EWA SAYS ALOHA TO DAVE REID

Dave Reid, construction superintendent, bade farewell to Ewa last Friday morning preparatory to leaving for a trip "down under" with Mrs. Reid preceding his retirement.
Mr. Reid will have had 35 years of service with the Company on his retirement date, February 1, 1960.
He came to Ewa from Scotland on February 16, 1925 and started out as chief Blacksmith. Four years later, he was promoted to shops superintendent replacing Mr. McGregor who left the plantation to live in Scotland. At that time, the shops under Mr. Reid included the blacksmith shop, paint shop, carpenter shop and car shop.
In March, 1942, the civil engineering department changed its name to construction department at which time Mr. Reid took over the department until the day of his departure from Ewa last week.

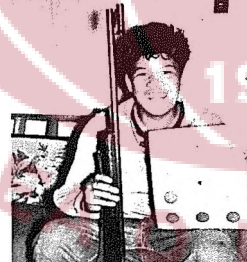
Businessmen Invited To Schools
