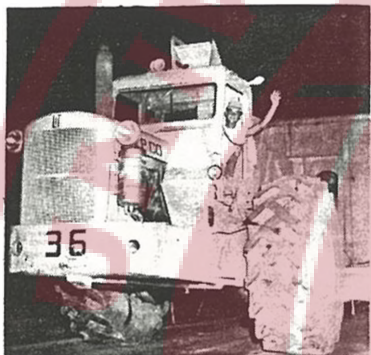
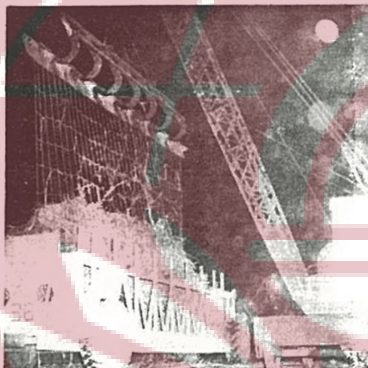




The End of Our '56 Crop

The last load of cane from the 1956 crop was brought in at 10:00 p.m. on Monday, September 10th. Grinding was completed at midnight.

Sugar production for the year was 57,727 tons. This is 273 tons less than the estimate of the crop made before harvesting started.

According to the experts, the lower production this year was due to the weather. While the crop was growing through the last two years, temperatures were lower and there was not nearly as much sunlight as usual. Records show that the sun was too often clouded over, even though the days appeared bright and warm.

Tons of sugar per acre harvested amounted to 13.34, which is a good figure, but not as

good as we have had in past years. The tons of cane required to produce one ton of sugar averaged 8.10, as against 7.58 for last year. The dull weather also made it difficult to ripen the cane.

Other successful candidates elected into office were: Shungo Jo, vice-president; Linda Shinozawa, secretary; and Jose Narciso, treasurer.

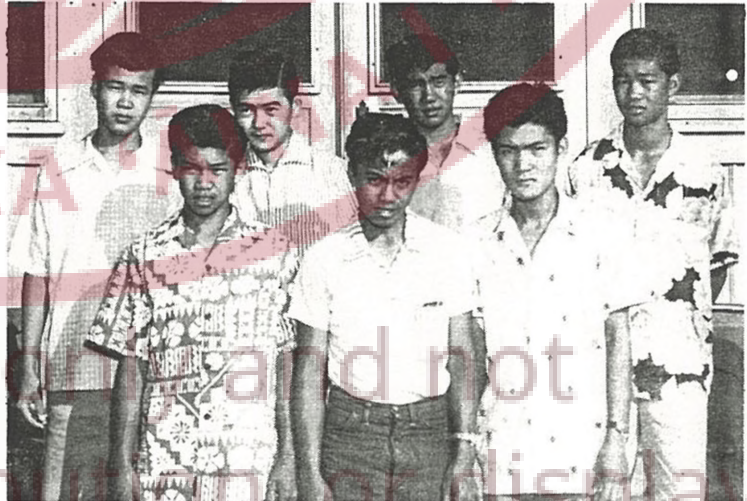

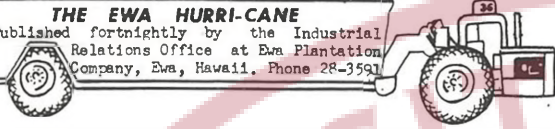

On November 6, 1920, he came back to embark on his long career at Ewa.

MARGARET CORPUZ, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. TEODORICO CORPUZ of Middle Village, recently left for a month's vacation on the

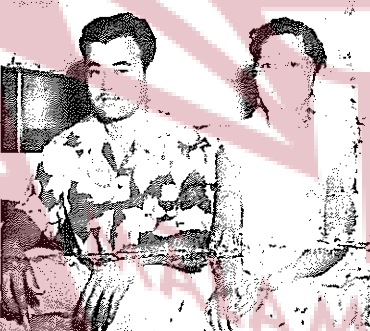

1203 In Student Body; Up 98 From Last Year



The total enrollment at Ewa School this year increased by 98 students. The student body is now 1,203.

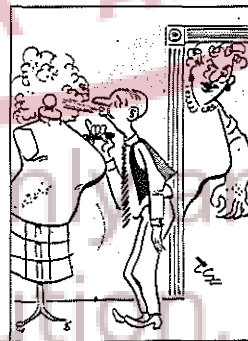
